

From General Presbyter Roy Martin

our presbytery met last Tuesday, and the ruling elders, clergy, and others assembled there got to hear about the progress being made in several areas:

- 1. The New Congregational Development Committee is moving forward in their study of what it takes to start a new church and has begun discussion about possible locations for developing a Presbyterian presence.
- 2. The Committee on Mission and Outreach brought for a vote a new organization for our relationship with the Florida Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Network (FLAPDAN) and reported on developing new presbytery-wide mission opportunities.
- 3. The only thing holding back the Committee on Congregational Revitalization is the Covid-19 pandemic. Once the way be clear, they are ready and excited about working with congregations in considering where God

might be leading their ministry. At this meeting, they requested and received approval

- 4. The Committee on Ministry presented Erin Rosica for examination to be ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacrament and to have her validated ministry as a hospital chaplain be approved. Erin has been a candidate under the care of our Committee on Preparation for Ministry. She was approved!
- 5. The Presbytery
 Administration Committee
 reported that, while we did
 not make our asking
 budget, many of our
 congregations stepped up
 to the challenge by
 pledging more than they
 ever have before. Several
 pledged more than they
 were asked!
- 6. It was with great

sadness but also with much gratitude for their ministry over many years that two Administrative Commissions requested and received permission to close two of our churches, First, Port St. Joe and Westminster Pensacola. We thank God for these two churches and their witness to the faith!

- 7. The Committee on Preparation for Ministry brought for approval their process for guiding ruling elders who have heard the call to the specialized ministry Commissioned Lay Pastor (CLP). Once trained and approved, these dedicated elders can serve congregations who can no longer afford called and installed pastors. The process, while not as rigorous is similar to the candidacy process used to prepare ministers of the Word and Sacrament.
- 8. We heard a report from the Planning and Coordinating Commission that they have voted to move the presbytery year (but not the budgetary year) of calendar. Beginning next year, the new presbytery year will open

About commissioners to presbytery for 2021

rticle III of the By-Laws of the Presbytery of Florida provide for one ruling elder commissioner from each congregation. Churches with membership above 500 are entitled to additional commissioners. Our number of congregations is currently at 39. We have 4 congregations with membership between 501-1000 who are entitled to two ruling elder commissioners:

Pensacola, First; Pensacola, Trinity; Quincy, First; Tallahassee, Faith.

This will provide for 43 ruling elder commissioners.

Board University

Article III further states:

...each ruling elder elected moderator or other officer of the presbytery, each ruling elder elected as a member of the leadership team of presbytery or as chairperson of the nominating committee, and each ruling elder elected as coordinating presbyter or associate presbyter (when applicable) and exempt staff (when applicable) shall be enrolled as a member of presbytery for the term of his or her office, whether or not commissioned by his or her session.

The ruling elders for 2021 service that would be included in this count are Roseanna Phillips,

Leslie Yandle, Don Mowat, Denise Vandiver (treasurer), Jeannie Dixon (Stated Clerk), Ben Powell (Director Dogwood Acres). There are 5 Commissioned Ruling Elders serving congregations.

That gives a total of 54 ruling elders.

The number of ministers of Word and Sacrament is 28 plus 9 ministers serving at-large plus 1 from other tradition enrolled as members.

There are 42 retired ministers of Word and Sacrament; 6 are active.

This results in 51 ministers of Word and Sacrament; there is no imbalance of ministers of Word and Sacrament to ruling elders.



New Handbook outlines steps in partnering for renewal

CR is pleased to report that our Handbook for Congregational Revitalization was approved at the February 23rd presbytery meeting! This Handbook outlines a process that we can use as we partner with congregations desiring a more formal approach to renewing congregational vitality.

This process involves the use of two instruments to help congregations gauge their "place": MissionInsite, which surveys a congregation's community demographics; and Holy Congregational Revitalization

Cow! Assessment, which looks more deeply into the congregation itself. Both instruments are vital to understanding the lay of the land as our CCR consultants work to address the needs of a congregation.

If your congregation is at a point where you think some attention could be paid to revitalization of mission and ministry, please contact me! Don't wait until you're "desperate" for help; oftentimes it's almost too late at that point! Not saying it's impossible, but the road to renewed vitality is a steeper climb! 
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



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Ring the bells for climate justice on March 11

n the last two columns, I have explained the Greenfaith, Sacred People, Sacred Earth campaign, calling people of faith around the world to address the climate crisis. I am pleased to report that, in response to their call for action, the Tallahassee faith community is holding a day of climate action, called "Ring the Bells for Climate Justice" on March 11, from 9:30 -11:00 EST on Zoom.

Speakers will share what they are doing to address the crisis, and churches will ring their bells at 11:00. Commissioner of Agriculture Nikki Fried will talk about her heat illness prevention campaign to protect farm workers. Senator Lori Berman and Representative Anna Eskamani will discuss their bills requiring Florida to switch to renewable energy. Reverend Latricia Scriven with New Life UMC will share how black churches are responding to the crisis. Charlotte Stuart Tilley, a young climate

activist like Greta Thunberg, will discuss her Friday school strikes on the steps of the old Capitol for climate action.

The bells are ringing the alarm about the climate emergency that is already hurting so many Floridians, especially the poor and people of color, and the need for a fair energy transition that leaves no one behind.

Knowingly harming the "least of these" is contrary to the teachings of all religions. Our faiths ask us to protect our neighbors and creation, vet our actions are harming both. Florida is ground zero for the worse effects of climate change - sea level rise, hurricanes, and extreme heat – and most of us have already felt their impacts. Unfortunately, this crisis is only going to get worse without state action to cut our carbon emissions.

Please join us on March 11 by emailing me at pammcvety@hotmail.com for the Zoom link. If you have church bells, ring them loudly or make a sacred noise from 11:00-11:15. Tell all who

inquire that you are calling for climate justice for all Floridians, but especially for the "least of these" who are hurt first and worst by climate change. Together our voices are powerful.

Finally, pray for the people of Texas as they continue to recover from loss of power and water from the mid-February frigid weather which lead to burst pipes, damaged homes and infrastructure, avoidable deaths, and food and gas shortages.

Yes, this is related to climate change. The polar vortex which used to stay in the Arctic moved deep into Texas as the warmer weather at the north pole pushed it south. And no, their power system and grid did not fail because of reliance on renewable energy. It failed because of failure to adapt state infrastructure to meet the inevitability of climate change.

Association of Smaller Congregations Upcoming Conference ~ March 19–20, 2021

The Association of Smaller Congregations (ASC) of the Synod of South Atlantic, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was organized in April 1987 by a group of visionaries led by the late Rev. Foster Edwards, a PC(USA) minister in the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta. The ASC sought to create an organization which would:

- Encourage and support smaller congregations,
- Promote awareness of the unique strengths and needs of smaller congregations,
- Provide opportunities for fellowship, education, and creative thinking and sharing between smaller congregations, and facilitate communication between churches, presbyteries, and higher governing bodies.

All churches and their members within the ecclesiastical bounds of the Synod of South Atlantic, having 100 or fewer members are considered members of the ASC.
