




help them guide their congregations into a deeper understanding and appreciation for the events surrounding the events of the birth of Christ.

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Meet Levi Draheim, a Climate Leader

think about climate change every day, basically," he says. "I'm extremely worried. When I was younger, I used to have nightmares, that I was basically looking at my barrier island and sea level was just rising and it was really hot."

Levi Draheim is a cute kid, but, unlike most 12-year-olds, he does more than spend his free time outside playing and enjoying his friends. He, at the young age of ten, chose to be a climate leader in the fight for justice for his future and the planet.

He lives on Satellite Beach, a barrier island off Florida, just 13 feet above sea level. His island has been impacted by red algal blooms and powerful storms, both enhanced by climate change. After Hurricane Matthew (2015), Levi volunteered to replant dunes at the beach where he does weekly litter clean-ups.

In 2015, Levi and 20 other children under age 18, sued our federal government over its failure to defend them against climate change. The children assert that they have a constitutional right to live in a world



safe from climate
disasters. He also is part
of a lawsuit against the
state of Florida. Of
course, he may not fully
understand the legal fine
points of these cases, but
his fears and commitment
are real and strong.

It is worrisome, because it speaks so loudly about our failures when children are stepping up to lead because adults are not.

over these lawsuits. It appears that Levi joined the lawsuit against the US government when a local minister got involved. As I mentioned in my last column, in Florida, the faith community has its own amicus brief in support of the Florida Our Children's Trust lawsuit.
