Presbytery By-Laws, Manual of Operations updated

At the Presbytery's stated meeting in May, the presbytery approved changes to both our By-Laws and our Manual of Operations. Copies of both were made available before the meeting; one version showed all the changes, and the other version was a "clean" version with the changes in place.

The Manual did not require a second reading, meaning it could be changed at the same meeting at which changes are proposed. The By-Laws, however, required a second reading, meaning that it would be October (the next stated meeting) before proposed changes could be given final approval. In order to avoid the situation with the Manual and By-Laws being "out of sync" the rules were suspended for

the By-Laws so they could be approved at the meeting.

The changes to both documents were to align with the new structure presbytery approved last October. The By-Laws had a couple of additional changes.

- To align with changes in *The Book of Order*, terms such as "teaching elder" were changed to "Minister of Word and Sacrament".

- A new method of including resident honorably retired ministers was added in Article III: Membership. HR who wish to be inactive in terms of determining the balance of ministers to elders may now register as an "inactive participant" for the year. Information on how to do so will be issued later this year.

- The moderator-in-nomination for the presbytery was changed to vice-moderator, a more commonly used term.

- Specific job responsibilities are moved to an appendix, rather than being part of the By-Laws document

- The quorum for the presbytery was changed from six ministers and six elders from 3 member congregations to 10 ministers, 10 elders from 10 member congregations.

- The process to change the By-Laws was modified to allow changes at a regular stated or special meeting, as long as the changes are distributed in writing ten days prior to the meeting. Approval of the changes will require a two-thirds vote.


Natural Church Development principles; built unique, literature-inspired Advent experiences, and created materials for and taught Reformed Theology for commissioned ruling elders.



The Committee on Educational Resources recommends ... *Love First* – by Colette Potts

The idea of love has seemed to be a strong virtue in fantastic people. One of my current favorite books is *Love Does* by Bob Goff, so I searched for a way to incorporate this love with children while teaching Sunday school and mid week programming. I found a book called *Love First*, by Collette Potts.

She is the wife of an Episcopal Minister and a family therapist, who was asked to take over and develop a relevant children's program. And while she could have taken over and followed the status quo, she chose to try something different.

This isn't your average curriculum: Potts sets the



model to be Love of God, Yourself and Neighbors, based on Matthew 22:36-40. With a small team, she was able to develop a program that pulled in the congregations' strengths, as well as ways to help children have a meaningful worship

experience and connection with an older community within the church walls.

Potts also addresses hurdles of outdated spaces, curriculum choices, busyness and lack of parental resources, by this simple and minimalist presentation; she even leaves time for Liturgical calendar events. If you have been in ministry for awhile and are looking for some fresh air, or if you are new to ministry looking for a foothold, this book can be a great resource for you:

CCR awards grant to help fight food insecurity

The Committee on Congregational Revitalization is honored to partner with congregations that want to enhance food sustainability ministries. At our last meeting, we awarded \$3,500 to Care and Share Community Food Pantry, endorsed by First Presbyterian Church of Chipley.

According to the application that was submitted, Care and Share Community Food Pantry assists any resident of Washington County that suffers from food insecurity, either chronically or acutely. Our grant will bless that ministry as they feed more than 3,000 residents each year.

This grant is made possible through Florida Presbytery's 2 Cents a Meal grant. Applicants may download the grant application on the presbytery's web site and submit to CCR by postal mail or scan/email at least one week prior to our scheduled meetings. We have a limited amount of funds to share, so we request that each congregation endorses a maximum of one request per calendar year.

CCR is blessed to help congregations through the 2 Cents a Meal grant,



because food insecurity is a serious matter. If your congregation is engaged in a creative food insecurity ministry, we'd love to hear from you! Let's share ideas and be a blessing to each other as we minister together in this part of God's kingdom!

CCR's primary focus is....revitalization of congregations (hence the committee name!). Our committee is continuing to grow in understanding and education of our ministry since the presbytery's committee structure was revamped and approved by the



presbytery in January. So that we may better serve, soon we will be training volunteers to work directly with particular congregations through Holy Cow, a Presbyterian-founded organization that utilizes helpful tools to help identify the health and vitality of congregations. Our goal is to begin training Holy Cow volunteers this fall so that they will be ready to assist particular congregations before Advent and Christmas.

We are also planning to utilize MissionInsite, the demographic analysis organization, with whom the presbytery has partnered for many years. To date, it has been used very little. That will soon change!

Using MissionInsite, which looks at the external community surrounding a church, and Holy Cow, which looks at the internal health of the congregation, we will be able to live into the calling of helping congregations become revitalized. Climate Change – The Moral Issue

By the time you read this, I will have preached a sermon on “Climate Change – The Moral Issue” at the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Rhinelander, Wisconsin. My message was simple. We know that we are harming God’s creation by continuing to burn fossil fuels.

We have the knowledge and power to stop it, yet we don’t. This failure to act along with the harm climate change is causing to “the least of these” makes responding to climate change a moral issue.

The UCC has an almost 50-year history of issuing policy statements on the environment and climate change. In fact, they passed the first denomination-wide resolution on divesting from fossil fuels in 2013, while we Presbyterians have failed to pass such a resolution three times.

The UCC also addressed renewable energy in the mid-1970s and passed its first of many resolutions on climate change in 1999. It appears to be easier for members of the United Church of Christ than for Presbyterians to speak out on the immorality of profiting from fossil fuels. The UCC is also the denomination that has brought us Reverend Jim Antal, whose book, *Climate Church, Climate Change* I wrote about in my last two columns.

We all need to hear that climate change is a moral issue and that the time to act is incredibly short. What happens in the next few years will profoundly affect the next thousand years and beyond. Are we going to let the future slip away from us, or as people of faith, are we going to demand the one action that can really make a difference, cutting our

carbon emissions in half by 2030?

Unfortunately, with the current leadership, we are actually increasing our carbon emissions to record levels, by opening up public conservation lands and offshore waters for more drilling and mining, by eliminating existing federal carbon cutting programs and by continuing federal fossil fuel subsidies which are ten times the amount we spend on education. For now, at least, we cannot count on national leadership on climate change, but that shouldn’t keep us from continuing to press for powerful action.

I end my sermon by saying that the Church of Jesus Christ has a challenge unlike any that it has ever faced. As people of faith, advocates for justice and people of strong moral character, we must stand up and bear witness to the reality of climate change and the harm it is causing to all of God’s creation. We must demand action that counts.


