And, on top of all that, there was such a good spirit all through the meeting! There was singing and laughter and prayer and great joy. In other words, we had church!


I am further encouraged that I have had several requests to offer another round of officer training by Zoom as I did last year. I am happy to say that you will see a flyer in this newsletter


Attendees enjoy fall weather and fellowship at Oct. 23 presbytery meeting



CCR suggests stillness and pause in the season ahead

Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas are upon us! And with these special and sacred seasons in the church year come budget making, stewardship season, election and training of new deacons and elders, and an analysis of how we've done in the passing year and what we'll hope to do in the coming year.

Typically, there's more activity in congregational life in the fall than in any other season. This year's fall season is similar to last year's, in that the pandemic is still with us, though thankfully it is decreasing in numbers of cases and positivity rates. We have a lot to be thankful for, don't we?

Still, this year is somewhat different. As we come out of Covid and begin to meet and worship in person once more, we may want to rush into doing as much as possible in our church life, catch up for all we've missed over the past seasons. But, perhaps this year, November and December can be reflective, quiet, and calm as we re-engage with congregational life almost post-pandemic.

Congregational revitalization has its roots in God. "I am about to do a new thing" God declares through the prophet Isaiah (43). New is good, we say! Bring it



on! We're more than ready to see/do/learn/be something...new! Activity of any kind is a blessing, after what we've been through, right?!?

Isaiah follows up God's declaration with a question: "Can you perceive it?" The act of perceiving the new that God is about to do requires a watchful eye, a discerning spirit, an awareness. "Be still, God says through the Psalmist, and know that I am God." (46) Being still can be uncomfortable for us, especially after nearly

two years of pandemic stillness. We'd rather rush headlong into what's before us than be still and quiet in the presence of God who goes before us.

CCR is taking a break from working with new congregations during November and December. We need to "be still" so that we can be more aware of the "new thing" that God is about to do among the wonderful congregations that make up Florida Presbytery.

The committee and I encourage you and the congregation of which you are a part to pause, give thanks, and rest secure in God who has been with us these many pandemic months, and who will journey with us into the futures that God has planned for us.



**Review: *Teaching Hard History: American Slavery*
(Video series produced by the Southern Poverty Law Center, 2021)**

As Reformed Christians, we believe in one God: Father-Son-Holy Spirit. Another name for the Holy Spirit is “the Spirit of Truth”.

According to John 8:32, Jesus tells his disciples, “You shall know the truth and the truth will set you free.” As Jesus’ followers, we are committed to know and proclaim what is true, including historical truth. Often such truth is hard because it reminds us of human sinfulness and of our bondage to sin. Thank God, when we recognize and confess our sins, God is faithful and just to free us from our sins and to cleanse us of all unrighteousness.



Since the State of Florida has placed restrictions on the way history can be taught in public schools, our churches have an opportunity to teach children and youth the hard history of our culture’s past and present. The Southern Poverty Law Center has produced 10 videos that teach the

truth about slavery and its consequences. Various historians and scholars have contributed to this examination of slavery and its impact on the lives of enslaved people and on our nation’s development. The series shows how those enslaved have influenced our history and the culture in which we live, providing comprehensive K-5 and 6-12 frameworks and resources. Presbyterian Climate Change actions both disappoint and excite

I am sometimes disappointed and occasionally excited by what our denomination is doing to address the climate crisis, but always grateful that the Lord has not given up on us, even though we are failing to protect his creation.

An ongoing example of what disappoints me is the Presbyterian committee, Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI), bragging that it is having a [successful proxy season](#) while, year after year, not doing the one thing that it has the power to do – put our faith before our money by divesting our fossil fuel holdings. Then I read [young Presbyterian clergy were arrested](#) along with Indigenous people in front of the White House, where they were asking the Biden administration to take stronger action to address the climate crisis. This is courageous faith-based leadership that excites me and makes me proud to be a Presbyterian.

MRTI, composed of Presbyterian financial folks and others, proclaims it is addressing the climate crisis and being successful when the United Airlines board of directors agrees to conduct an *evaluation* and issue a *report* on how its lobbying activities align with the Paris Climate Agreement’s goal of limiting global warming to below 2 degrees Celsius. Thirty years ago this would have been an accomplishment. Today it is



very little, when one considers that we are in a crisis. That MRTI feels successful and brags about it, because it gets a motion passed that leads to a report while refusing to categorically divest from an unrepentant industry whose carbon emissions are destroying creation, is incomprehensible.

October 11, Indigenous People’s Day, 136 people, including three Presbyterian clergy whom I know and highly respect, were arrested in front of the White House while calling on President Biden to declare a climate emergency and stop approving fossil fuel projects.

I have often wondered whether I would have the courage to get arrested, because breaking the law is a huge sacrifice. **This act of civil disobedience is evidence of how concerned these clergy are about the climate crisis and how normal opportunities to bring about change are failing us, even in the church.** It also is a testimony to their

deep faith and witness to God’s command in Genesis to care for all of his creation.

So, I am both disappointed in part of our church for its unremarkable response to the climate crisis, and indebted beyond measure to the brave clergy who are sacrificing themselves for the future of my grandchildren. In our irrational world, these clergy give me hope and buttress my belief that the church has an important role in addressing the climate crisis.

Bravo to these gutsy leaders, Reverends Abby Mohaupt (who doesn’t capitalize her name), Rob Marks and Colleen Earp who are following in Jesus’s footsteps by making a personal sacrifice, and who are affirming the Biblical mandate to “keep” his creation.

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
