- was present, and Moderator Trinity Whitley opened the meeting with prayer. Presbytery approved the

- 85 MORNING WORSHIP The Rev. Brant Copeland (HR), led worship assisted by The Reverend Trinity
- Whitley, Mark Broadhead, Joan Wooten, and Roy Martin. The worship and Brant Copeland's sermon
- on Ephesians 1:11-23 celebrated All Saints and appreciation of everyday saints. A necrology report
- and moments of silence at the reading of names celebrated ruling elders and teaching elders who died
- from October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022. The presbytery observed the sacrament of the Lord'
- 90 Supper and celebrated God's faithfulness to all generations of God's people.

91 EDUCATIONAL HOUR: The Committee on Representation and Committee on Nominations

- educated the presbytery as to the process and procedures of nominating people to serve on presbytery
- committees and to seek representation of all aspects of our membership, to generate participation of our
- members in the life and work of the presbytery. At present, 68 people are serving the 83 positions of
- service, leaving an 18% vacancy. Following the presentation, the presbytery divided into discussion
- 96 groups exploring hindrances to calling people to serve and suggesting ways to inform and engage
- people in the working of the presbytery. The CR and CN will review the information and suggestions as
- they continue their work.

- 105 UKirk Campus Ministry- Tallahassee: Matt Frease: Fall semester 2022 went well and the staff and
- volunteers have addressed the intellectual, emotional, and spiritual aspects of students' lives. The
- Thursday night meals have been well attended, as have the fellowship community Bible studies.
- 108 Upcoming Events: The College Conference at Montreat on January 2-5, 2023. UKirk invites students
- from all area colleges to attend the conference, not just Florida State University students, and they
- encourage pastors, DCEs, and Sessions to encourage students from their congregations to attend with
- the UKirk participants. 2025 is the 75th Anniversary of UKirk: The campus ministry has been in

- programs and facility updates from congregations.

- 6. Steve Rhodes raised thoughts and questions: We must be honest about our expectations of this
- person. and honest about a timeline for the ministry being self-sustaining. PNC needs to be very
- 285 attentive with NCD pastor in setting initial goals and priorities for the congregations. Staff should be
- added during the initial growth period, not buildings! NCD pastor will need PNC's help in navigating
- 287 the balance between a "retiree" church and a "family" church.- When to start worshiping regularly is a
- 288 key! It would be disastrous to start and then pause for a while. It doesn't matter what the worship looks
- 289 like as long as its roots are "reformed and Presbyterian." Remember, many of those attracted will not
- be of Presbyterian background. Suggestion: Do not start worshiping regularly until you have a firm
- financial commitment from a core who want to start the church. Starting a new church is about face-to-
- face relationships. We should use all the technology that is available, but nothing beats going to the
- schools to watch a game or recital, visiting folks in their offices and workplaces, and a visit on the back
- porch watching the waves!

- 332 Stewardship is using this total for Shared Mission Requests from each congregation. Those requests
- have been emailed to each church. Printed copies of these requests are available from presbytery office.
- The 2023 budget was submitted for review and for adoption at the February 2023 presbytery meeting.
- 335 *Personnel* Rev. Eric Spoon has established individual committees for each staff person and continues
- to develop a system of evaluation and support for our staff. This work is ongoing.
- For action: Presbytery Office construction at DWA. Upon motion by the CPA and discussion,
- presbytery approved the construction of a new office at Dogwood Acres, estimated cost \$496,000.000
- to be paid from presbytery's restricted funds.
- Discussion Highlights included: expanded office space, fire-safe files storage, the same firm that
- designed and built Monroe Lodge. Brant Copeland pleaded for consideration of solar panels on the new
- building, for both stewardship of the environment and of the presbytery's finances. Solar panels were
- not considered in the plan/cost estimate.

 - Emphasizes that those who file complaints, bring allegations, or seek vindication, as well those who are accused or act as counsel must be Presbyterian.
 - Mediators, facilitators, and advocates need not be Presbyterian but need to be familiar with Church Discipline.
 - Presbyterians can file allegations on behalf of persons who are not Presbyterian.
 - Adds an alternative form of resolution based on principles of restorative justice.
- Provides for three forms of alternative resolution: Restorative Justice, Mediation, and Other Negotiated Agreements.
 - Allows for mediators who are not certified, but who are "persons known for calm, wise counsel."
 - Provides flexibility in crafting censures and remedies.
 - Spells out specific remedies appropriate to each degree of censure.
- Adds language explaining that censure in church discipline is given not with malice or vindictiveness but in Christian love to offer correction in error and to restore the unity of the church when possible.

- 3 Membership: Chair, vice-chair, seven members-at-large
- 4 Purpose: To provide processes and support for congregations that have an identified need,
- willingness, and ability to engage in spiritual and/or programmatic growth which can lead to deeper
- 6 commitment both within and beyond current membership.

7 Items for Information:

- 8 Congregations engaged in the revitalization process:
- **DeFuniak Springs Bethel Church:** Shelia Askew continues to work with the Bethel congregation
- as it works on upgrades/updates to the church facility and ministry outreach to the community
- 11 surrounding the church.
- Panama City Grace: Harvey Jenkins continues to work with Grace Church's Revitalization Team.
- 13 They continue to explore their call for ministry in that area, as well as realign their budget for 2023.
- Milton First: Mark Broadhead is the consultant for Milton-First. The newly-revised revitalization
- team has been exploring their identity as a congregation, what they believe they are called to be and do,

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- Rationale: Under the previous structure of the Presbytery, this committee was tasked to promote
- 37 congregational renewal by providing helpful programmatic and ministry ideas. The assigned function
- since restructuring has taken a different focus. Rather than being prescriptive in its assistance, it has

- 39 become descriptive, that is, the committee now engages congregations first in a discernment process
- 40 that helps congregations discover who they are.
- This is the foundational work of this committee. The discernment process reveals the degree of health
- and vitality of the congregation, addressing if the congregation is able to truly gain from the
- revitalization process or if the congregation needs to face a different reality like its dwindling ability
- 44 to sustain itself and its ministries.
- The concern with using "revitalization" as part of the committee's name is because it may promote a

Report from the

Committee on Dogwood Acres (CDWA)

- 3 Membership: Chair, vice-chair, 11 members-at-large
- 4 **Purpose:** To provide short and long-term planning, management, development, operations, and
- 5 programs connected with Dogwood Acres.
- 6 The CDWA was busy last fall, meeting twice via Zoom on Thursday, October 6, and in hybrid mode
- on Saturday November 12. In addition, Personnel has conducted year-end evaluations, a special
- 8 committee has re-vamped the budget to simplify it, property improvements have been made, and our
- 9 staff has organized and led two new retreats so far this year.
- 10 Highlights include:
- 11 Property –

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- roadway milling has been used to patch the driveway and enhance the parking
- trails have been cleared of debris and re-opened with the exception of part of the blue trail.
- a new ability-friendly prayer/nature path has been created, looping from the chapel and around to the bonfire area and back. The path has been cleared and milled and work continues on landscaping and bench-building
- the new storage building is now completed and being used
- renovations have been completed on a total of 6 cabins and new curtains are currently being made
- a new lumber shed has been completed and a new floating dock is under construction presently
- 21 Retreats
 - a Presbytery-wide Confirmation Retreat was held for 26 young people representing 7 churches from our Presbytery.
