After experiencing a delightful old fashion hymn sing at First Presbyterian Church of Lynn Haven this past Sunday, I am inspired to offer one of my favorite hymns for your consideration. "Be Still, My Soul" was a product of the German Lutheran Pietistic movement in the early 18th Century.

Katharine von Schlegel authored the words. Unfortunately, not a lot is known about her, but it is believed she may have been the canones of an evangelical women's seminary in Germany. The hymn was translated into English about 100 years later by Jane Borthwick of Edinburgh, Scotland.

The tune is an arrangement of one movement of Jean Sibelius' "Finlandia."

I find great peace in singing this old hymn as it invites us to trust in God in all of life's circumstances. Sometimes in singing a hymn, we get so lost in the tune we lose sight of

the words. Read them below as if for the first time:

Be still my soul – the Lord is on thy side!

Bear patiently the cross of grief or pain; Leave to thy God to order and provide –

In every change He faithful will remain.

Be still my soul – thy best, thy heavenly Friend Thru thorny ways leads to a joyful end.

Be still my soul – thy God doth undertake

To guide the future as He has the past;

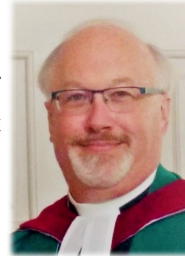
Thy hope, thy confidence let nothing shake –

All now mysterious shall be bright at last.

Be still my soul – the waves and winds still know

His voice who ruled them while He dwelt below.

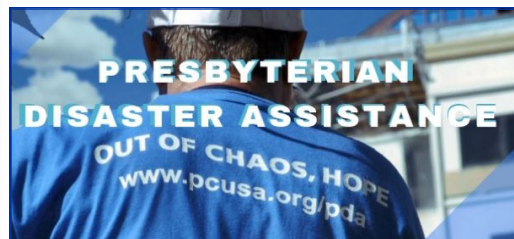

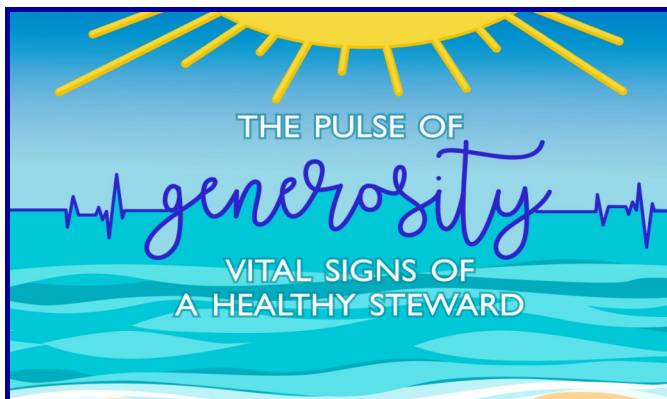
Oklahoma group assists 1st, Chipley, during Florida trip

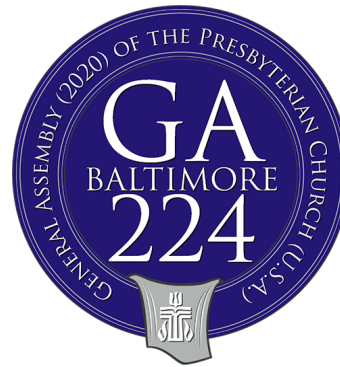

The Bible Project: Biblical Learning for the Digital Age

Have you ever been met by a room of blank stares when you make a reference to a Bible character at a youth meeting? Or opened an adult study with a poem and folks not realize it was a Psalm?

The reality for those of us in ministry in the PCUSA is that we work with people who love God, love the church and love their neighbor but don't spend too much time reading or studying the Bible.

We could bemoan the lack of Christian education that happens in homes and the inconsistent attendance of many children, youth and adults to church school or worship that adds to this Biblical illiteracy. Or we can search for resources that ignite an interest in Bible study to multiple generations.

This summer, as we were planning for our church's first ever Confirmation Camp, we knew we had to do some Biblical "catching up" for the youth involved, and we only had a week! We had youth who were basically un-churched. We had youth who were consistently in worship but never in church school, and we had those who came to everything but seemed to primarily

stare at the phone in their lap. What could we use that was biblically based, theologically solid and also attention-grabbing? That's when we found The Bible Project!

The Bible Project is a crowd-funded, non-profit animation studio that produces videos, posters, podcasts and books to make the story of the Bible accessible. The Bible Project helps people understand the epic narrative of the biblical story, the many plots, literary genres, themes and how they are part of a unified story that culminates in the person of Jesus.

The creators of The Bible Project realize that the Bible is a complex book to read and it takes work to understand it. But, once you learn how to read it, the Bible is transformative.

Not only is God's word transformative, but The Bible Project transformed our approach to Confirmation Camp! We were able to watch the overview of the Old Testament (15 minutes) and then have youth begin to recall the stories of Abraham, Sarah, Moses, Joseph and David from their church school classes. (Yes, information was in those



bright minds, we just had to nudge it to the forefront!) We were able to dive deeper into understanding because the videos were informative and engaging. The same was true for the New Testament overview.

The Bible Project has over 130 videos on books of the Bible, themes within the Bible, word studies and seasonal reflections. It also has over 200 podcasts for personal or group study. These are great videos for youth or adults and could be used at church to start a class discussion or at home for individual study. You might also consider using these in an intergenerational forum during the season of Advent or Lent. There are so many possibilities.

In a time when people in our congregations are more on-the-go than ever, offering a podcast that will enrich their understanding of scripture, or a video that might spark a young person to pull out their Bible and read it, is a true treasure.

The Green New Deal

What climate policy would Jesus choose? Certainly, one that protects his creation and helps the “least of these.” Two major Christian denominations have spoken out in support of the Green New Deal (GND), and Young Evangelicals for Climate Action, a youth organization, has praised what it called the Green New Deal’s “biblical principles.” So, what is this new deal?

The original New Deal was, of course, the set of social and economic reforms and public works projects that President Franklin D. Roosevelt crafted in response to the Great Depression. This New Deal is called “green” to reflect its dual goals of addressing both climate change and economic inequality by the same means.

Currently, the GND is represented by a pair of pending resolutions in Congress—a big, bold transformation of the economy to tackle today’s twin crises of economic inequality and imminent climate change. It would mobilize public resources to help us transition from an economy built on exploitation of fossil fuels to one driven by



dignified work and clean energy. It proposes to:

- transition the country to 100 percent clean energy by 2030;
- foster massive growth in jobs in clean manufacturing;
- work with farmers and ranchers to improve agricultural sustainability;
- invest in infrastructure that supports zero-emission vehicles, public transit systems and high-speed rail;
- eliminate the long-term adverse health and economic effects of pollution from fossil fuel use;
- preserve land and plant trees;
- clean up hazardous waste; and
- promote the sharing of ideas and innovations with other countries.

At this point, the Green New Deal is a set of nonbinding Congressional resolutions—more a compilation of ideas than even a proposal. It must

be implemented by legislation that is not yet crafted. It is, however, realistically designed.

Its goal of transitioning the country to 100 percent clean energy by 2030 is entirely realistic. It is supported by sound science, and is the kind of ambitious goal that the climate crisis demands. Moreover, its goal of helping “the least of these” through the tough and costly transition to clean energy is a feature that Jesus would most definitely like. If you are thinking that it will be expensive, you are right—but the monstrous costs of ignoring climate change are unimaginably more disastrous and would cripple our economy.

So far, the Green New Deal is one of two major proposed national solutions that address the climate crisis. The other is the proposed Carbon Fee and Dividend legislation, which I will explain in the next column. Given how life-threatening and irreversible our situation is, I am grateful for the leadership that recognizes the crisis we are in and offers a way forward.
