87 **OPENING PRAYER, QUORUM, DOCKET**

88 Moderator Michael Askew called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM CST/10:00 AM EST. A quorum was
89 present, and Moderator Askew opened the meeting with prayer. Presbytery approved the docket as
90 presented by Stated Clerk Jeannie Dixon.

91 **INTRODUCTIONS:** First-time ruling elders, teaching elders, corresponding members, and visitors
92 were introduced.

93 **MORNING WORSHIP** led by Teaching Elder Hamilton substituting for Ruling Elder Alice Malone,
94 Teaching Elders Jordan Goodwin, and Casey Aldridge, newly received into the presbytery. 1st, Lynn
95 Haven, Music Director Brad Thoreson led in lively music and spirited singing. Rev. Casey Aldridge,
96 graduate student at Florida State University, preached on the text Job 42:1-6, 10-17 exploring aspects of
97 human suffering and theodicy. He summarized, “It is not theology or theodicy that will comfort those
98 who mourn or bring down systems of alienation or oppression. It is only the presence of God, the love
99 of the Holy Spirit, and the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in each one of us that can bring hope to a
100 hurting world. May we go from here to serve God by being present to the suffering of others, joining
101 them in the divinely-instigated transformation of their condition.”

102 Worship included the annual necrology report and remembrance of teaching and ruling elders who died
103 in the last year. Jeannie Dixon and Roy Martin read the names, with each person remembered by tolling
104 of a bell by Brad Thoreson. The presbytery then sang with gusto “For All the Saints.” Casey Aldridge
105 then concluded with a benediction.

106 **EDUCATIONAL TIME: Committee on Mission and Outreach: Hugh Hamilton**

107 Hugh Hamilton, Vice-Chair of CMO, presented a PowerPoint program on Mission Assessment: What is
108 Working or Not Working in Your Congregational Mission and Service Endeavors, And Why? Utilizing
109 the PC(USA) Mission Agency’s resource CALLED TO MISSION: FINDING OUR PLACE IN
110 GOD’S MISSION, Hugh led a discussion of Modes (strategies) of Mission Engagement (Hands-on,
111 Empowered Partners, Advocacy) and why certain modes suit or do not suit your congregation. Again,
112 why, why not, and which might you try? Then followed an overview of the suggested Mission
113 Discernment Process and evaluation guides, including basic questions to guide your discernment
114 process: WHY do we engage in mission? WHAT does our congregation’s mission engagement look
115 like? WHO participates in our mission efforts and who might become involved? WHAT cultural
116 divides might we be crossing as we engage in mission? WHO will serve as our link between us and our
117 partners? The PC(USA) Mission Agency materials then present a questionnaire and self-evaluation
118 guide to help your mission teams to THINK about your congregation, LEARN as you gather essential
119 information, PRAY regularly, and PAY ATTENTION to signs, senses, indicators. Each step has
120 poignant and practical suggestions.

121 Sharing personal reflections and examples, Hugh explained how this guide had informed, challenged,
122 and clarified Trinity-Pensacola’s Mission and Outreach Team as they assessed their service and mission
123 endeavors. Lastly, Hugh shared a 5-part Self-Assessment Quiz, by which participants made discoveries
124 about themselves and their congregation’s mission endeavors and considered next steps for planning
125 mission projects, programs, and initiatives. What did you learn? What might you do next? What might
126 you do differently? Who needs to be involved as you proceed?

127 The Committee on Mission and Outreach presentation offered practical, challenging, and personal
128 examples that may help congregational mission teams avoid “mission creep” and “mishmash missions”
129 and thereby refocus and reenergize their mission efforts.

132 **MINISTRY REPORTS**

133 **PARTNER REPORTS: UKirk Tallahassee: Matt Frease**

134 Summer 2021 work at UKirk involved remodeling the center's kitchen, apartment, baths, and
135 landscaping. Congregations provided meals and workers, materials, and finances. More work is needed
136 as the Student Center reopens with post-COVID restrictions. Congregations are invited to provide
137 meals, programs, resources, and finances.

138 **STAFF REPORTS**

139 **REPORT FROM STATED CLERK: Jeannie Dixon**

140 Property: re Incorporation of our churches: All but four churches are incorporated: Bethel,
141 Blountstown, Woodland, and Monticello. Bethel (not incorporated) property is listed as Bethel
142 Presbyterian Church c/o Thomas Jordan. Blountstown (not incorporated) property is listed as
143 "presbyterian church." Woodland (not incorporated) property is listed as Church Woodland
144 Presbyterian at Sawdust. Monticello (not incorporated) property is listed as Presbyterian Church (plus a
145 manse (?) listed as Tr. Of Presbyterian Church) . The following show differences in property appraiser
146 owner's name and the incorporated name: Milton – property appraiser Presbyterian Church {2 parcels;
147 one at 205 Elmira}; incorporated name First Presbyterian Church of Milton, Florida, Inc. Gulf Beach –
148 property appraiser and incorporated name match (Gulf Beach Presbyterian Church of Panama City
149 Beach, Inc.) but a vacant lot is listed as owned by Gulf Beach Presbyterian Church. Lynn Haven –
150 property appraiser lists owner as Presbyterian Church while the incorporated name is First Presbyterian
151 Church (U.S.A.) of Lynn Haven, Florida, Inc. St. Andrews – deed listed as St. Andrew Presbyterian
152 Church; incorporated name is St. Andrews Presbyterian Church of Panama City, Florida, Inc.
153 Meetings Attended as part of Stated Clerk duties: Board of Pensions update webinar in May, COM
154 meeting for July, Workshop on Parliamentary Procedures (part of the Year of Leader Formation from
155 OGA), July CPC meeting, Savannah Presbytery's School of the Laity course 'History, Mission and
156 Polity'

157 COVID-19 PANDEMIC CONDITIONS: Stated Clerk has compiled COVID numbers (average daily
158 new infections and positivity rate) for our counties comparing April 30, 2020, July 19, 2021, and July
159 26, 2021; updated to include August and September dates.

160 MAIL PROGRAMS: Stated Clerk is researching mail programs for staff use due to inability to
161 communicate with Board of Pensions and other entities due to a security issue with IONOS.

162 ANNUAL STATISTICS: The statistics "season" will open on Dec. 3, 2021, and close at midnight on
163 Feb. 17, 2022. This does require session approval; enter your data, print the PDF report, get approval,
164 then click SUBMIT.

165 We are looking for hosts for the 2022 presbytery meetings: Feb. 22, May 21, August 23, October 25.

166 **REPORT FROM GENERAL PRESBYTER: Roy Martin**

167 Roy Martin shared with the presbytery insights from Susan Beaumont's Alban Institute publication,
168 *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You Are Going?* He finds it as a helpful resource in
169 considering how do we lead in uncharted territories of pandemic challenges, cultural shifts, changes in
170 the PC(USA) and stewardship challenges, in this "liminal season" (Beaumont).

171 The presbytery's Stewardship Team is ready to meet with Sessions to present the mission and financial
172 needs of the presbytery in preparation for Session's submission of 2022 financial pledges to the
173 presbytery.

174 Roy Martin is offering a Zoom class presentation on Presbyterian Polity for all interested persons to
175 attend online Sunday afternoons in November 2021.

176 **REPORT FROM DOGWOOD ACRES: Bill Lamont**

177 Dogwood Acres was thrilled to host the presbytery meeting and the fellowship gathering on Friday
178 night. In 2021 DWA was able to offer retreats and modified summer camp under COVID-19 safety
179 protocols. Campers maintained a safe distance from all others at camp by eating, sleeping, and
180 associating only with those in their own cabin. Adult chaperones and staffers remained in the “bubble”
181 with their campers for the day’s routines. Camp sessions were combined due to slow enrollment and the
182 last week of camp was cancelled when two counselors tested positive for COVID. COVID challenged
183 summer operations, but staff and DWA Teams operated a safe and fun season for campers, and they
184 were thrilled to hear the joyful sounds of kids at Summer Camp! They look forward to a full 2022
185 season.
186 Several retreats are booked in Fall 2021 and youth conferences are scheduled in December.
187 The DWA Committee is working on a vision of a bright future at DWA and the staffing model
188 necessary to fulfill their mission.

189 **REPORT FROM ACCOUNTANT/TREASURER: Denise Vandiver**

190 Ms. Vandiver reviewed the complete financial reports of the presbytery. As of September 2021, we are
191 at 70% of budgeted shared support when we should be at 75%. CPC had budgeted \$46,000 from
192 reserve funds to balance the budget if needed; to date we estimate using only \$28,000. We have
193 reserves of approximately \$300,000. Treasure Vandiver appealed to churches to please catch up if you
194 are behind in your shared support contributions.

195 **COMMITTEE AND COMMISSION REPORTS:**

196 **REPORT OF THE COORDINATING AND PLANNING COMMISSION (CPC):**

197 An Administrative Commission/Listening Team is working with Parkway Presbyterian Church,
198 Panama City. Parkway Pastor Ric Connor retired at the end of August. Kim Stavenau has agreed to be
199 the Temporary Supply pastor beginning in October. The AC is working to ascertain the church’s
200 financial status.
201 The tentative presbytery 2022 budget was approved by the CPC to allow the Stewardship planning to
202 begin. They presented an updated budget for approval at the October meeting.

203 **COMMITTEE REPORTS FOR ACTION/UPDATES**

204 **Committee On Congregational Revitalization (CCR): Lisa Martin**

205 CCR is engaged with three congregations seeking revitalization. CCR is implementing the basic tools
206 of Mission InSite (local demographics) and Holy Cow! Consulting (congregational assessment) to aid
207 congregations in their effort to remain or become vital centers for ministry and mission. CCR’s
208 Revitalization Toolbox is now available for use by sessions and/or congregations that want to explore
209 quality online, print, and published revitalization resources, authors, and links to resources. The link to

212 **Committee on Mission and Outreach (CMO): Hugh Hamilton**

213 FOR ACTION: Presbytery approved CMO’s recommendation of a new international mission
214 partnership with the National Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Guatemala (IENPG) and National
215 Presbyterian Women of Guatemala. CMO will now pursue clarification of costs, arrangements,
216 agreements, and possible participants.

217 Rationale:

- 218 a. The USA is working to improve living conditions in Guatemala so that people there will not need or
219 want to leave and immigrate to the USA.
220 b. The mission organization seeks improve educational and vocational opportunities for women and
221 children, to empower women who have little rights or resources, to improve educational opportunities
222 for children, to improve health and water conditions.
223 c. This ministry is a bold move to reach and serve the most vulnerable population in the name of Christ.

224 d. This ministry is working through the National Presbyterian Women of Guatemala; perhaps the PW of
225 our presbytery will become a dual partnership?
226 e. The leader, Eliana, has a long-standing relationship with churches in Guatemala; affording us more
227 comprehensive materials and contacts for review, and opportunities to present online leadership
228 training, education workshops, reciprocal team visit to Guatemala and to Florida Presbytery.
229 f. Mission teams from our churches and/or individuals may engage in the work and an ongoing
230 partnership between our presbytery and their regional leadership may enhance our cultural exchange
231 and gospel ministries.

232 If the partnership is approved in premise, we will then pursue further clarification of costs,
233 arrangements, agreements, and possible participants.
234 Presbytery approved the updated policies and grant application forms for 1) 2 Cents a Meal Hunger
235 Grant and 2) Presbytery of Florida Peacemaking Grant. The policies and grant application forms are on
236 the presbytery website and included at the end of CMO report below.
237 Presbytery approved a) the Presbytery of Florida Anti-Racism Guidelines, Revised September 2, 2021,
238 b) that the Anti-Racism Task Force operate under the auspices of the Committee on Mission and
239 Outreach (CMO) and the Committee on Education Resources (CER), and c) that funds be identified to
240 include Anti-Racism Task Force operations in the presbytery budget.
241 Presbytery did not approve CMO's recommendation that the Self-Development of People (SDOP)
242 program be dropped as it is not a viable project at this time and that SDOP be removed from the CMO
243 responsibilities. Presbytery directed the CMO to engage in more conversation with SDOP national staff
244 to see if the hurdles to SDOP process and financing can be remedied and recommendations be brought
245 back to presbytery by CMO.

246 FOR INFORMATION:

247 1. Resourcing Congregations: The reports received from congregations listing their current mission and
248 service endeavors will compiled and categorized by topics/types of activities/areas of involvements.
249 Congregations may discover others doing similar type ministries and find shareable resources or
250 partnerships. We are creating a "Missions Bank" 1) to identify ways we may help each other and 2) to
251 identify possible regional/presbytery district missions coordinators at each church.
252 2. Mission-Oriented Workshops and Missions Fairs: beyond our October 2021 Presbytery educational
253 workshop, we hope to share on a regular basis information about your congregational mission
254 endeavors, Anti-Racism Task Force resources, and additional mission assessment tools and incentives.
255 3. FLAPDAN: The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) and FLAPDAN Covenant agreement is
256 fully executed and signed by all Florida presbyteries. FLAPDAN representatives are finalizing the
257 qualifications of board members and presbyteries are asked to appoint liaisons/board members in winter
258 2022. The Leon County Volunteer Services in Tallahassee which serves the counties in the East District
259 of our presbytery is asking for a FLAPDAN representative to coordinate with them. Tim Crawford will
260 assist until someone in the East District is secured.

261 DISASTER RESPONSES: PDA/FLAPDAN are supporting relief efforts in response to fires in
262 California and Hurricane IDA aftermath, Haiti earthquake – but unrest in Haiti due to COVID-19, their
263 President's assassination, other economic and social unrest, and damage to infrastructure, roads, and
264 gang violence continue to make getting support to need difficult in Haiti. Earthquake statistics:
265 Approx. 130,000 homes damaged/destroyed, 2,200 deaths, over 12,000 injuries, 650,000 need
266 humanitarian assistance. FLAPDAN is working with PDA project monitor and other groups in Haiti to
267 identify needs and to provide financial grants, food, recovery supplies, temporary shelters.

269 FLAPDAN Budget: FLAPDAN is financially sound however support from Presbyteries down slightly.
270 Due to increases in disaster events, FLAPDAN is requesting 10% increase in giving from presbyteries
271 and to increase to level giving among all presbyteries.

272 4. Anti-Racism Task Force:

273 The presbytery heard Glenn Hodges and Sun Kim share their experiences of racism and prejudice as an
274 African American and an Asian individual and clergy. Their testimonies shared what we as white
275 Americans do not see, notice, or comprehend and they raised our sensitivities to the cultural and
276 systemic pressures facing our society. We appreciate their honesty and vulnerability and pray that God
277 will bless our efforts at anti-racism.

278 The CMO approved new members of the Anti-Racism Task Force: Sun Kim, Greta Reed, Ruth
279 Reynolds, Susan Byram, Jeannie Dixon, Joan Wooten. Luis Ocasio will serve as CMO liaison to the
280 task force. The previous and new members of the Task Force have been meeting, exploring options to
281 have testimonies of Black and Indigenous People of Color (BIPOC) shared at future presbytery
282 meetings to humanize racism, to put a face on racism, to hear from people we know their experiences of
283 racism. The Task Force will update and share with presbytery a racism resources list of print and
284 electronic media. The Task Force will update Presbytery policies and training experiences to address
285 issues of racism. The Task Force plans to move from educational to a missional work.

286 The Presbytery approved the Task Force and CMO recommended Presbytery of Florida Anti-Racism
287 Guidelines.

288 Presbytery of Florida Anti-Racism Guidelines

289 September 2, 2021

290 Rationale

291 “Then God said, ‘Let us make humanity in our image, according to our likeness’” (Genesis 1:26).

292 “As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer
293 Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one
294 in Christ Jesus.” (Galatians 3:27-28).

295 “God has created the peoples of the earth to be one universal family. In God’s reconciling love, barriers
296 between brothers and sisters are overcome and every form of discrimination based on racial or ethnic
297 difference, real or imaginary, are overcome.” (The Confession of 1967, paraphrased from Section 4).

298 For centuries, the church and its people have been both complicit in and wounded by the racism that
299 infects our nation and the world. A great majority of us who are members of the Presbyterian Church
300 (U.S.A.) have accepted the lie of white supremacy. We have not been obedient to God’s Word
301 incarnate and in scripture. Those of us who are white have failed to acknowledge the advantages we
302 reap from a prevailing, systemic racism. Faithfulness to Jesus Christ, Head of the church and Lord of
303 life, leads the Presbytery of Florida to adopt anti-racism guidelines.

304 Approach: Presbytery’s approach begins with anti-racism training.

- 305
- 306 • Anti-racism training will be provided in the Spring of 2022 and annually thereafter for all ministers
307 of Word and Sacraments, educators, commissioned ruling elders, candidates for ministry,
308 Presbytery committee chairs and staff.
 - 309 • Anti-racism training is to be grounded in scripture and in theological principles inherent in the
310 Reformed tradition and versed in social and historical perspectives.
 - 311 • Anti-racism training is to be provided by the “I Stand with You” sub-committee of the Committee
on Mission and Outreach using trained consultants.

312 Actions: Additional actions are needed in response to God’s Word that calls us to “be doers of the
313 Word and not merely hearers who deceive themselves” (James 1:22). Presbytery’s actions include the
314 following:

- 315
- 316 • Proclaiming and practicing the Word of God in scripture and in the life and ministry of Jesus
through preaching and teaching at Presbytery meetings and events.
 - 317 • Supporting anti-racism activities by encouraging and offering guidance to congregations to
318 conduct listening sessions, workshops, book/video discussions, educational group studies, and
319 field trips.

- 320 • Challenging congregations to offer hospitality through inclusive gatherings for worship, meals,
321 Bible studies, and open conversations about racism.
- 322 • Publicizing denominational and ecumenical hands-on mission trips and ministries with
323 neighboring congregations of differing majority ethnic constituents.
- 324 • Supporting bias and de-escalation training for law enforcement personnel by informing
325 congregations of community groups already engaged in dialogue with law enforcement agencies
326 and encouraging them to ally with them.
- 327 • Fostering adequate and non-discriminatory funding of public schools by encouraging
328 participation in school board open meetings and alliances with state and local advocacy groups.
- 329 • Advocating for re-integration programs for those leaving incarceration by identifying existing
330 advocacy groups.
- 331 • Working for adequate healthcare, food, housing, and environmental justice by engaging with
332 agencies such as “Feeding the Gulf Coast.”
- 333 • Encouraging congregations to engage in public action for justice, compassion, and humility in
334 society by sending email, letters, or telephoning.
- 335 • Continuing to discover ways to address the root causes of racism, pursuing equal justice, and
336 promoting the recognition that there is only one race – the human race – by establishing
337 relationships with people of all colors and allying with advocacy groups such as the Florida
338 Council of Churches.

339 Administration: Administration of these guidelines will be the responsibility of the Committee on
340 Mission and Outreach and the Committee on Education and Resources. Funding for anti-racism training
341 and action will be provided to those committees through the annual budget of the Presbytery.

342 **Guidelines for Reviewing 2 Cents a Meal Grants for the Presbytery of Florida**

343 All grant applications will be reviewed; however, priority will be given to the following:

- 344 • Grant applications within the bounds of the Presbytery of Florida and sponsored by a
345 congregation in the presbytery.
- 346 • Grant applications that are sponsored by churches in the Presbytery of Florida that have never
347 sponsored a grant or have not done so in some time.
- 348 • Grant applications that have the greatest demonstrated need as determined by the Committee on
349 Mission and Outreach (CMO).
- 350 • Grant applications that address an area of the PCUSA Presbyterian Hunger program other than
351 direct food relief.
- 352 • Grant applications that have kept administrative cost to a minimum.

353 Other criteria:

- 354 • Grant applications must demonstrate an ability to provide the services indicated in the grant
355 proposed.
- 356 • A report on the use of a grant will be required within 6 months of awarding the grant.
- 357 • Grants to any one project or program will limited to one grant each 18 months.

358 **Deadlines for Application:** Applications are received twice annually:

- 359 • By January 31 and June 30, for review and action in February and July.
- 360 • For 2021 we are accepting applications by November 1 for 2022 First Quarter grants.

361 **PCUSA PRESBYTERIAN HUNGER PROGRAM AREAS**

362 The five areas of the Presbyterian Hunger Program are:

363 **1. Education and Interpretation.**

364 a. The program educates the church and the public at large about the root causes of hunger and
365 prepares and motivates people to act and to educate others.

- 366 b. The program provides opportunities for learning among and with communities of need.
 367 **2. Direct Food Relief.**
 368 a. The program provides food relief to poor people in either acute or chronic condition of hunger.
 369 b. The program is looking for long-range solutions.
 370 **3. Development Assistance.**
 371 a. The program provides for a multi-faceted approach to development and the empowerment of
 372 poor people in such areas as agricultural development, nutrition education, and public health programs.
 373 b. The program increases employment opportunities or assists unemployed or underemployed persons.
 374 **4. Public Policy.**
 375 a. The program advocates, through just and peaceful means, policy changes in political and economic
 376 systems which provide food for poor and hungry people at home and abroad.

512 still awaiting confirmation from the ruling elder to whom we have reached out to be a reader. If you
513 would like to be an exam reader in coming years, please let us know.

514 2. Lauren Scott met with the CPM at our September meeting and after a moving sermon and successful
515 examination, the committee voted to certify her ready to receive a call, pending her graduation from
516 Columbia Theological Seminary in May 2022. This means Lauren can begin circulating her PIF.

517 3. The committee met with Glenn Hodges and, after discussion about his journey and former process
518 under care of this presbytery, voted to receive him as inquirer. During this October presbytery
519 meeting, Glenn will reintroduce himself to the presbytery and give a brief personal update on his

556 (Raymond Guterman) and the committee are aware of the need for more CLP's. If anyone knows of
557 someone wanting to become a CLP, please let Rev. Trinity Whitley (current CPM chair) and Rev.
558 Guterman (next year's chair) know.

559 **Committee on New Congregational Development (CNCD):**

560 CNCD reminded Presbytery of the newly approved policy manual "Launching New Worshipping
561 Communities." The 16-page manual is now available on the Presbytery's website.

562 **Committee on Educational Resources (CER):** No report.

563 **Committee on Representation (CR): Glenn Hodges**

564 The newly recommissioned committee has begun its work with members: Tae Ho Cheong, Aracelis
565 Fernandez, Glenn Hodges, and Emily Proctor.

566 1. The committee has engaged the Committee on Nominations and the Committee on Presbytery

1 **Report from the Administrative Commission**
2 **for Parkway Presbyterian Church, Panama City**

3 **For information:**

4 Minutes of January 10, 2022

5 Present: Rev. Carol Wood - Chair, Elder Sandra Young, Rev. Mark Broadhead

6 Guest: Rev. Kim Stavenau

7 Purpose: To review Rev. Stavenau's ministry since beginning in October.

8 The meeting opened with prayer by Elder Young at 2:00 p.m.

9 Rev. Stavenau reported that congregational participation in worship and special events has increased
10 significantly. There is a good spirit among congregation members and excitement about being together.

11 The congregation is discerning its vision for ministry and emerging as a congregation to help meet the needs
12 of elderly persons. Their outreach ministry continues to grow as does participation in worship, educational
13 opportunities, and congregational activities.

14 The number of persons needing pastoral care is somewhat daunting. Several persons have lost spouses to
15 death. Several others are under hospice care. Ten persons have failing health issues. Rev. Stavenau is
16 experiencing ministry similar to a "hospice chaplain."

17 Because of the amount of pastoral care needing to be provided, Rev. Stavenau's office hours have changed
18 to 8-9:30. Pastoral visits will be done between 9:30-11:00.

19 Office volunteers are working out well. Six persons carry out the administrative work

20 The current church van is up for sale. It is not elderly-friendly. Transportation for the elderly is a concern.

21 A diverse Session is working well. The training that Rev. Roy Martin facilitated was sincerely appreciated.
22 Organization continues to take place among session members.

23 The 2022 budget is in process, eliminating the "fluff." Finances are sufficient at this point, and a better
24 understanding of where finances are going is becoming known. The congregation is very generous with
25 their financial resources. We noted the need to schedule a congregational meeting after the 2022 budget is
26 completed.

27 FEMA update – working through a large amount of paperwork and receipts. Each item is being looked at
28 carefully. As a result, the process is quite thorough but time-consuming. A deadline for dealing with
29 Hurricane Michael is looming, so some speed will need to be applied to the process.

30 Rev. Stavenau was reminded of the semi-annual reports due to the Committee on Ministry. Her first report
31 is due early March. The form for the report can be found on the Presbytery's website.

ID Cards

Minister ID cards will be sent out in February. They will have an expiration date of March 1, 2023.

Annual Statistics

The deadline for annual statistics was Feb. 17, 2022. Multiple emails were sent and phone calls made. As of Jan. 30, 2022 24 congregations of the 37 had submitted their information.

Commissioners to Presbytery for 2022

Article III of the By-Laws of the Presbytery of Florida provide for one ruling elder commissioner from each congregation. Churches with membership above 500 are entitled to additional commissioners.

Our number of congregations is currently at 37. We have 4 congregations with membership between 501-1000 who are entitled to two ruling elder commissioners:

Pensacola, First;
Pensacola, Trinity;
Quincy, First;
Tallahassee, Faith.

This will provide for 41 ruling elder commissioners.

Article III further states:

...each ruling elder elected moderator or other officer of the presbytery, each ruling elder elected as a member of the leadership team of presbytery or as chairperson of the nominating committee, and each ruling elder elected as coordinating presbyter or associate presbyter (when applicable) and exempt staff (when applicable) shall be enrolled as a member of presbytery for the term of his or her office, whether or not commissioned by his or her session.

The ruling elders for 2022 service that would be included in this count are Jean Norman, Denise Vandiver (treasurer), Jeannie Dixon (Stated Clerk), Glenn Hodges, Leslie Yandle. There are 3 Commissioned Ruling Elders serving congregations.

That gives a total of 49 ruling elders.

The following Christian Educators meet the provisions outlined in the By-Laws (Article IV, #5) to have voice and vote at Presbytery Meetings: (certified Christian Educators who are also ruling elders, or Christian Educators who have five or more years paid church related Christian Education experience and also ruling elder)

Jeannie Dixon –Tallahassee (CCE and RE)
Carol Deloach – Christ Presbyterian Church, Tallahassee (5+ years and RE)
Lisa Wilder – First Presbyterian, Quincy (5+ years and RE)

That gives an additional 2 RE (excluding Jeannie Dixon who is also Stated Clerk) for a total of 51 ruling elders.

The number of ministers of Word and Sacrament is 28 plus 9 ministers serving at-large.

37 There are 41 retired ministers of Word and Sacrament; 21 are active (either serving on a committee, on
38 the pulpit supply list, or serving a congregation).

39 This results in 58 ministers of Word and Sacrament; there is no imbalance of ministers of Word and
40 Sacrament to ruling elders.

41 **Annual Necrology Reminder**

2

3 **Membership:** Chair, vice-chair, five members-at-large

4 **Purpose:** To coordinate local, national, and international mission work through congregations and
5 mission communities by providing information and resources and to oversee and coordinate
6 presbytery-wide mission work.

7 **For action:** CMO recommends the following persons be approved as our presbytery representatives on
8 the Florida Presbyteries Disaster Assistance Network (FLAPDAN) Board of Directors:

12 **For information:**

13 **Resourcing Congregations for Mission**

14 CMO has secured Mission Liaisons from 10 of our congregations. We need your responses, too.

15 CMO member Susan Byram has emailed to known congregational liaisons a request for updated news
16 on your mission endeavors and has submitted to pastors, clerks of Session, and/or correspondents a
17 request that you appoint a Missions Liaison to the CMO through whom the CMO may share mission
18 endeavor highlights and by whom your Session/congregation may communicate to the CMO
19 congregational mission endeavors. Susan will be asking for Presbyterian Women contact persons with

20 whom the CMO may share information about our emerging mission partnership with the Presbyterian
21 Women of Guatemala.

22 **Conducting Mission-Oriented Workshops:**

23 CMO is coordinating a DISCIPLEFEST workshop with PC(USA) Mission Agency staff as
24 continuation of the CMO presentation at October 2021 presbytery of the PCUSA Mission Handbook
25 resources helping congregations discern the effectiveness of their mission endeavors, how to plan
26 mission endeavors that work best with their style and approach to service.

27 **Presbytery International Mission Partnerships**

28 CMO member Becky Rose is working with Eliana Menezes, our partner in Guatemala, to secure a
29 staffer to serve as an official point person and peer colleague for Roy Martin, General Presbyter. The
30 draft mission partnership agreement is being drafted for presbytery's review, revisions, and
31 recommendations.

32 CMO has ideas and suggestions for ways to establish relationships between individuals and
33 congregations and Guatemalan Presbyterian Women officers and women participating in their programs
34 and outreach.

35 Presbyterian Women of Guatemala manages two scholarship programs to which churches may
36 contribute:

- 37 a) Adult Women in Poverty – funds support their efforts to obtain elementary and middle school
38 education. The average educational level for women in Guatemala is 4th grade USA. Annual
39 scholarship is \$1200.00.
- 40 b) Theological Classes at one of four Presbyterian Seminaries in Guatemala – for women pursuing
41 Christian Education – cost is determined by level degree pursued. Tuition Scholarship is
42 \$300.00 annually.

43 CMO will explore available funds we way use to provide scholarship(s) and will share the possibility as
44 a special offering by congregations interested in Guatemala.

45 **FLAPDAN: Tim Crawford.**

46 FLAPDAN is working on addressing minor disaster/crises needs to enable preventive measures to
47 better equip congregations and communities for disaster preparation, recovery, and response. Though
48 PDA and FKLAPDAN target major disaster recovery and response efforts, the new initiatives may
49 provide similar benefits to communities at lower costs and involvements.

50 We recommend the following persons be approved as our presbytery representatives on the FLAPDAN
51 Board of Directors:

- 52 George Woodward – Quincy, First Presbyterian Church
- 53 Tim Crawford – Crestview, First Presbyterian Church
- 54 ___ Pending ___ - Pensacola, Trinity Presbyterian Church

55 **Anti-Racism Task Force**

56 The Anti-Racism Task Force is planning a presentation at Disciplefest 2022 workshops and an
57 educational hour at the May 2022 presbytery meeting offering anti-racism training to clergy and
58 commissioners.

59 **Hunger Action Grants**

60 CMO approved a \$3000,00 grant from the Presbytery 2 Cents a Meal Hunger Funds to the Lynn Haven
61 FL First Presbyterian Church for their Backpack Ministry purchasing healthy food for food insecure
62 children at Lynn Haven Elementary School. The Ministry currently serves 30 students and their
63 families, reaching 135 people every weekend.

64 **Self-Development of People**

65 At the October 2022 Presbytery Meeting, CMO was directed to explore present operational
66 requirements and funding for SDOP committees in presbyteries.

67 On January 6, 2022, CMO participated in a Zoom online conference with SDOP national staff members
68 Margaret Mwale and Alonzo Johnson.

69 Ms. Mwale and Mr. Johnson reviewed the history and focus of SDOP national, which has been poverty
70 eradication and commitment to racial justice, working to create relationships by which communities can
71 do their own localized work to address both the needs and the causes of their poverty, hunger, and
72 injustice. SDOP helps the church and the community to learn about the issues, needs, insights, and
73 resources as they bring the Good News of the Gospel to the poor and increase people's ownership,
74 organization, and engagement at their local level.

75 The CMO shared their understanding of past SDOP efforts in our presbytery and what it requires to re-
76 initiate and regroup an SDOP Committee in our presbytery. In brief, an SDOP Presbytery committee
77 requirements are:

- 78 • Minimum of 5 members
- 79 • Majority of members need be members of the PC(USA)
- 80 • Majority of the members need be people of color, i.e., racial-ethnic members.
- 81 • A waiver may be requested in writing for one, but not more, of these requirements, for one and
82 one-half years, to allow the SDOP committee to meet membership requirements.

83 Instead of being certified for three years, you'll be certified for 1.5 years, and must meet the full
84 requirements to sustain the SDOP program. Re-certification takes place every three years.

85 **Funding to SDOP** has decreased significantly in recent years (SDOP receives 32% of the PCUSA
86 Easter One Great Hour of Sharing offering). Therefore, funding from SDOP to local presbytery SDOP
87 committees has reduced.

88 **Presbytery Projects vs SDOP Committee Projects.** The CMO asked if our Anti-Racism Task Force
89 efforts would be duplication or competition to SDOP projects: SDOP staff questioned if our projects
90 have the full scope of SDOP historical efforts at poverty eradication and the added SDOP efforts at
91 racial justice and racial economics. SDOP has educational elements and resources in poverty
92 workshops, materials, staffers and presenters available to address presbytery meetings issues of anti-
93 poverty, and anti-racism: Here is what **you need to do, should do, can do, and here is how you start.**

94 **Process/Procedure to start SDOP Committee in Presbytery.**

- 95 • A formally organized and approved group. Need not be a 501(c)(3) group.
- 96 • Low-income groups need to be represented on committee.
- 97 • Those who want to take charge to change their own lives
- 98 • Draw members from established and organized groups or groups who are organizing to work long-
99 term to change the conditions in their communities.

100 • SDOP committee representatives control the programs they own and from which they directly
101 benefit.

102 • Training by SDOP national staff is required – after submitting a document of certification as an
103 SDOP committee.

104 We have not yet been able to secure training materials for review, not clarify of what that training
105 consists, how often is it offered, length of training sessions and how many sessions in a training
106 series. We are awaiting those materials from SDOP national.

107 We do know that the required training and re-certification is done every three years, but terms on
108 SDOP committee need not be limited to 3-year terms.

109 **Interpretation of SDOP programs and procedures to presbytery:**

110 • Should be done, and is best done, by the presbytery’s SDOP committee themselves.

111 • Can be done by SDOP national staffers.

112 • Explanations needs to include the mechanics of the SDOP program, guidelines, requirements, and
113 initiatives of the SDOP national program

114 • The explanation to presbytery is best done by people with a passion for the SDOP program, as it is a
115 multifaceted program.

116 **OUR FINDINGS:**

117 The requirements for approved membership and certification of SDOP committees still challenge our
118 ability to secure representatives in our presbytery to meet SDOP requirements for certification. The
119 SDOP national organization requires that a presbytery SDOP committee be composed of no fewer than
120 five members and of racial-ethnic composition, and that certification is for three years, renewable every
121 three years.

122 Training requirements are extensive, but we have not yet discovered what constitutes training.

123 The SDOP committee alone determines which projects to fund, organize, oversee, and evaluate. The
124 presbytery votes only whether or not to fund the SDOP committee-selected project from presbytery
125 budget. SDOP only allocates \$3000.00 start-up funding to the SDOP committee. Our confusion
126 remains over the funding and oversight of expenditures of SDOP programs: the present SDOP national
127 policy is that if a project is to be considered for/by national level approval or at presbytery level
128 approval, no one outside the presbyter’s SDOP committee is to deny funding. Also, the SDOP budget
129 is not in the presbytery budget – the SDOP committee has its own budget of funds from SDOP national
130 not subject to presbytery approval.

131 If a presbytery cannot meet the SDOP organizational requirements, the regulations allow for a 1.5 year
132 certification to allow the SDOP committee to increase their committee membership to meet the racial-
133 ethnic requirements and to secure a full five member minimum status.

134 We see our presbytery’s Anti- Racism Task Force addressing the racism focus of a SDOP committee’s
135 work, and though we see benefits of the SDOP educational materials, we wonder of this would be a
136 duplication of efforts by SDOP and Anti-Racism Task Force members.

137 We have heard anecdotally that two members of our presbytery are interested in serving on an SDOP
138 committee.

139 We need much more clarification on organizational guidelines, operational guidelines, budgeting, and
140 certification of membership on SDOP committee. We will continue to seek clarifications. We will
141 consider if this is duplicating efforts of our present Anti-Racism Taskforce and is SDOP the best

142 approach and benefit in our presbytery. How do we effectively and efficiently create an SDOP
143 committee formation team?

144 After further clarifications, should we see a SDOP committee as attainable in presbytery, we will ask
145 that those persons interested in pursuing the service and the organizational efforts volunteer to take on
146 the efforts and pursue the recruitment, organization, certification, training, reporting, and administration
147 of a SDOP committee, as we have no CMO members available for the work. The SDOP would need to
148 act as a Task Force with liaison to the CMO.

1 **Report from the Committee on Presbytery Administration (CPA)**

2 **Membership:** Chair, vice chair, nine members-at-large

3 **Purpose:** To oversee the management of presbytery funds, property, and staff

4 **For information:**

5 • **2021 Budget**

6 The Presbytery ended the year with a surplus of over \$13,000. We received \$446,500.08 in revenue
 7 (including income from reserves). Our expenses totaled \$443,225.55.

8 • **2022 Budget**

9 The proposed expense Budget for 2022 is \$472,652. This budget was tentatively approved at the last
 10 presbytery meeting. Our current shared support pledges total \$322,837.20. There are still 11 churches
 11 who have not reported their shared support yet. We anticipate that the shared support will continue to
 12 come in as churches finalize their budgets for 2022. Our committee members are calling these churches
 13 to request their shared support pledges.

14 • **New Presbytery Office**

15 The CPA is currently exploring options to build a new presbytery office at Dogwood Acres. The initial
 16 funds would come from the sale of the Chipley office and Walton County properties. Currently, this
 17 totals around \$200,000. The most recent estimates for a new office building total around \$400,000. We

18 are currently drafting plans and drawings for a new office building that we would like for CPC to
 19 consider. These drawing should be available by the next CPC meeting. CPA requests feedback both
 20 from presbytery staff, Dogwood Acres, and the CPC about the needs for a new office and the use of the
 21 current building by Dogwood Acres.

22 **For action:** CPA moves that the presbytery give final approval for the proposed 2022 Presbytery
 23 budget.

Report from the Committee on Dogwood Acres (CDWA)

Purpose: To provide short and long-term planning, management, development, operations, and programs connected with Dogwood Acres.

For information:

The Dogwood Acres Committee was out in force to host the fall presbytery meeting on site at DWA on Saturday October 23rd. We hosted a social gathering the night before presbytery, inviting presbyters to dinner, a campfire and a singalong at the new amphitheater. The event was gratefully received by all, marking the first in- person gathering of presbytery since the beginning of the pandemic in March 2020.

Since then, the CDWA has worked through its subcommittees to conduct annual evaluations, prepare a job description for the new program director position, and to set up a search committee for this position. In January, Personnel Committee announced that they have negotiated a full-time contract with our director, Ben Powell, recognizing what has been true for years, that it is a full-time position.

Ben Powell has contracted with a cook for 2022. Cristina Carrol will be on site for summer camp as well as all retreats and conferences during the coming year. Our search for counselors for summer camp has not been as successful, in part because the recruitment/hiring cycle that helps perpetuate counselors has been interrupted by the pandemic. We are asking congregations to please help us in the search for qualified counselors for the summer of 2022.

Finally, Ben Powell announced that his lengthy efforts to secure a timber grant for DWA following Hurricane Michael have proven fruitful. DWA was awarded a grant of just over \$167,000. This sum will greatly help us with our plans to expand personnel for ministry in 2022. We look forward to serving our presbytery in the coming year through the growing ministry of Dogwood Acres.
