### Many ways to help post-disaster recovery efforts

arlier this year, the National Hurricane Center (NHC) reported a 60 percent chance of above-normal hurricane activity in the Atlantic basin. As of mid-October, there had been 12 named tropical systems, slightly below the average of 14 storms per season.

This year's activity includes one subtropical system, seven tropical storms, one category one storm, and three major hurricanes. Only one tropical storm, Chantal, made landfall in the US, making for a very soggy 4<sup>th</sup> of July weekend along the east coast, but causing only minimal damage. Most importantly, there were no deaths in the U. S. directly related to the storm – a much welcome

September is typically the most active month for tropical events. For example, the 2020 season set a record with 10 tropical or subtropical systems for the month. October's record was eight storms set in 1950, and November's worst

hurricane seasons were three storms; this has occurred seven different years, most recently in the 2024 season. Even these records show hurricane season is winding down by November.

While tropical weather effects this year have been minimal, long-term recovery work the result of previous years storms remains quite busy. There are currently 44 long-term recovery efforts underway throughout the state, including one at the extreme eastern edge of our own presbytery in Madison County. This means there is still a significant need for help and support as communities continue to rebuild.

If you are considering forming a Volunteer Team or already have one, there are many opportunities to serve, such as Host Sites or providing facilities for relief teams, including lodging and access to tools, equipment, and materials. Currently, two PDA-sponsored host sites are available in Florida:

one at First Presbyterian Church, Sarasota, the second in <u>Pinellas County</u> <u>at Oakhurst United</u> <u>Methodist Church</u>. (Please refer to the flyers on page 2 for contact information and details.)

Financial donations are also crucial for the ongoing recovery efforts and future disaster response. With fewer storm impacts this year, relief agencies have a chance to catch up on current workloads and replenish their supplies from previous years' storms. So now is an ideal time to contribute.

Here are links to two PC(USA)-affiliated groups where you or your congregation can give. All donations to these organizations go directly to support disaster recovery: FLAPDAN Disaster Relief Fund and PDA General Disaster Relief. There are also numerous other organizations accepting donations for disaster relief, should you prefer.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance's motto is "Out of Chaos, Hope". We can help PDA find Hope through their three courses of actions: "Give", "Act", "Pray".



### Grateful for birds

T ovember is the time we gather with family and friends to give thanks for all our blessings. I am always grateful for my loving family and dear friends, but this year is different. Each day, I am disturbed by more and more news about the unraveling of the programs that protect our health and creation. It is not hyperbole to say that things are bad, but it forces me to reach deeper than I ever thought possible, to focus on the beauty and goodness of God's creation as a way to cope with what is happening.

Birds are my go-to. I love to see them, hear them, read about them, and to think about them being able to fly, which I have always wanted to do. They bring me great joy and peace. It is a spiritual experience to be around them and here are some special things about birds that I enjoy.

First, Audubon painted some of his most famous bird portraits in Florida. Longtime friend Clay Henderson just published a beautiful book entitled, Audubon's Birds of Florida. Clay is an environmental attorney. educator and author. His book is a catalogue of a major exhibit at the Brown Museum of 91 original Audubon prints of Florida birds. Most of the prints are from paintings that he made

during his 1831-1832 expedition to Florida. It includes his most beloved bird paintings of the American Flamingo, Roseate Spoonbill and Louisiana Heron.

A really special Florida bird is the scrub jay, which is endemic to our state and isn't afraid of people. It is a blue and gray bird, about the size of a blue jay. It lives in a scrub oak, in a sandy and very hot part of Florida in the summer, the Lake Wales Ridge.

My ornithology professor, Glen Woolfenden, who looked more like a large linebacker than a bird watcher, conducted one of the world's most famous longterm bird studies on the scrub jay. I had the great joy of being in the field with him and experiencing the pleasure of having these birds land on my head and knees. Of course, I had might have had a peanut in my hand,

which they very much wanted.

In Wisconsin, where we summer, crows fuss rather loudly when they see a fox. Those poor critters can't get away with anything once a crow has spotted them. Crows are smart, and a group of crows will work together to drive a fox away.

Birds epitomize so much of what is beautiful about God's world – intelligence, astounding navigation and flying skills, vibrant colors, ability to work together to solve a problem, complex nest building, relationships with people and so much more. They give me joy, peace and comfort, and remind me that we live in and are a part of God's kingdom.

For what are you grateful? What about creation makes you happy and makes your days easier?

### **Dogwood Acres answers questions about 501c3 status**

t the October 2024 Presbytery **\\_** meeting, the recommendations of the Strategic Planning Taskforce were approved. One of those recommendations was that Dogwood Acres become its own 501c3 non-profit organization, separate from the Presbytery. Since that meeting, the Ministry of Dogwood Acres (MDWA) has worked towards that goal.

As our staff and committee encounter members of our churches, we realize there are consistent questions that we answer about who we are and who we will be in the future. Here are some of those:

### How will the ministry change when you are a 501c3?

We will still be the Presbytery of Florida's outdoor ministry; we won't separate. We will continue to work so that, when we do become our own non-profit organization, we continue our close partnership with the Presbytery and with our churches. A committee is working on the details of our partnership. The process will be completed in 2026.

Dogwood Acres was founded in 1966 by faithful Presbytery members who had a vision of a rustic retreat space for young people. Through the years, we have transformed into a retreat center and summer camp where adults, youth and children can enjoy nature and experience God in new ways. Our hope is that we continue to grow our programing, enhance our buildings and grounds, and increase our relationships with churches and other organizations.

### Will you still be a PC(USA) camp?

Dogwood Acres will remain a PC(USA)-related retreat center and camp in partnership with the Presbytery of Florida and our churches. We are rooted in our shared faith and history.

We will continue to host these Presbytery-wide, faith-enriching retreats: Spiritfest, Dogwood Youth Conference, Confirmation, and Summer Camp, as well as the adult retreats you have come to enjoy. In all that we do, no matter the group, we strive to plant seeds of faith and show Christ's love to all.

### Have you considered having non-PCUSA groups at camp?

Yes! We will do that in the future, and we do that now. Dogwood has always been open to other denominations and secular organizations using our facility. In the past three years, we have welcomed Christian schools, Catholic church groups, Lutherans, Methodists, community health organizations, restorative

justice groups, several non-denominational churches, a women's canoe group, Savannah Presbytery youth, and Florida Diabetes Association. And YES! We hope to continue to broaden the scope of the groups we welcome.

### What is your funding plan?

Our programing continues to grow; our donor base and partnerships with outside groups has increased. But we still fall short on our funding needs. We have been working with a camp consulting group to devise a realistic five-year plan.

We have already exceeded many of the plan's initial goals with our 30% increase in summer campers and our increase in groups we host. We must continue to engage more individuals, churches and groups in our ministry, both on-site and through donations.
